The Role

Maynooth University is committed to a strategy in which the primary University goals of excellent research and scholarship and outstanding education are interlinked and equally valued.

Due to the recent success in obtaining an ERC Advanced award to Professor Rob Kitchin (Data Stories: Telling Stories About and With Planning and Property Data), we are seeking three postdoctoral researchers to work on this project. The postdoctoral researchers will work on phase 1 and 2 of the project and will principally undertake the research for four case studies, including their preparation, fieldwork, analysis, and creation of their associated data stories, including coordination with the assigned creative writer/artist, as well aiding the organisation of exhibitions, and archiving and documenting the project. They will have experience of handling administrative datasets, using a variety of qualitative methods, and preferably familiarity with creative and artistic methods.

At least two of the postdoctoral researchers will have research experience in Human Geography, Urban Studies, or Planning. One post will preferably have research experience in Art and Design, Critical Data Studies, STS, Media Studies, or related disciplines.

The posts will be for 48 months, with an anticipated commencement of 01st February 2023.

Overview of the Data Stories project

The key idea of the Data Stories project is to focus critical attention on the underlying evidence base for planning and property activity (see https://datastories.maynoothuniversity.ie/). Planning and property data are a key to how cities are understood and managed. They inform government policy, shape public perception, and guide billions of euros of investment relating to land use and development, public and private housing, homelessness, commercial real estate, and infrastructure. Yet, relatively little close, critical attention has been paid to such data beyond some technical considerations related to data access, coverage, quality and interoperability. The Data Stories project will address this lacuna, undertaking a five year programme of research in order to examine the data politics, praxes and power operating within the planning and property domains. It is divided into two phases.











Phase 1 of the Data Stories project, which consists of (i) charting in micro-detail the planning and property data ecosystem for Dublin – all the databases, their content and their interconnections across state, business, civic society stakeholders, including transnational exchanges; (ii) interviewing key actors about their data work and experiences. The objective here is to examine forensically what data are generated, how they are processed, shared, and governed, and to identify any gaps. The postdocs will contribute to this phase in Year 1.

Phase 2 will work more closely with 12 sector stakeholders belonging to the Dublin data ecosystem (4 state, 4 business, 4 civic society) to conduct in-depth case studies. In part, this will involve using traditional social sciences methods (such as interviews, focus groups, observation of data generation procedures, walk-through interviews of data practices, in-situ ethnographies), but it will also employ research-creation methods utilising fiction and art practices (e.g., improvisational writing, word play techniques and facilitated conversations, and data art workshops that utilise data visualisation, physicalisation and creative media techniques), working with creative writers and artists to produce a set of data stories. Half of the case studies will produce data stories about, and half data stories with, planning and property data. The postdoctoral researchers will predominately work on Phase 2 of the project.

Principal Duties

Research, administrative, and other duties will include:

- Contributing to project tasks under the supervision of principal investigator Prof. Rob Kitchin and in collaboration with other project researchers, and contributing to research administration;
- Undertaking research in Phase 1 of the project, helping to document the planning and property data ecosystem and undertaking interviews.
- Leading four case studies in Phase 2 of the project, working with the PI, creative technologist, writer/artist, and the stakeholder organisation.
- For each case study being led, developing the research design, undertaking fieldwork, coordinating workshops, co-producing the data stories, and performing the analysis.
- Contributing to the documentation and archiving of the project into an open access repository, particularly related to the four case studies they are responsible for;
- Preparing the case study findings for public exhibitions and contributing to the organisation and running of the exhibitions;
- Writing up research for publication in international, peer-review journals, and presenting at national and international conferences;
- Helping with the organization of meetings and workshops related to the project;
- Assisting in the development and submission of new research proposals to funding agencies and other bodies;
- Complying with all University policies

The ideal candidate will have:

Essential:

• Either a PhD in Human Geography, Urban Studies, or Planning, or in Art and Design, Critical Data Studies, STS, Media Studies, or related disciplines.











- Strong working knowledge of planning, property, and housing issues and its underlying evidence base, or of data practices, policies and infrastructures within state, business and civil society organisations;
- A good working knowledge of handling and using administrative data, spatial data and databases;
- A deep knowledge and experience of using qualitative methods, particularly undertaking ethnographies, interviews and focus groups, and analysing the data generated.
- Excellent interpersonal skills and experience of working collaboratively in research teams and with external stakeholders.
- A willingness to work undertake interdisciplinary research and learn new knowledge and skills.
- Good project management skills, an ability to coordinate four case studies with stakeholders and to contribute to organisation of workshops, seminars and exhibitions.
- Ability to work with a degree of autonomy, manage workloads, deadlines, and responsibilities.
- A record of scholarly work and publication of international quality, appropriate to career stage;
- Excellent writing and presentation skills in English;

Desirable:

- Using and devising creative methods, such as creative writing, artistic methods, documentary filmmaking or live performance.
- Experience of working with artists and writers, or undertaking participatory practice, such as participatory GIS or citizen science.
- Experience of producing data stories and using interactive data visualisation.
- Experience of archiving data in an open repository.
- An ability to present research findings at international conferences.
- An ability to communicate effectively with non-academic audiences.
